Introduction

God has been telling one incredible story since before time began. At the center of it all? Jesus. Always Jesus. Every sunrise since the first light broke across creation, every ancient prophecy proclaimed in temple courts, every quiet moment in Bethlehem's stable—they all point to Him.

Over these next 25 days, we'll uncover something amazing together. We'll see how Jesus threads through every moment of history, from that first "Let there be light" all the way to His promised return. Each day holds a new discovery about who He is—the Beginning and the End, the First and the Last.

What's truly amazing is that He's not done writing. The same Jesus who shaped mountains and guided prophets now moves through your everyday moments—your Monday mornings and Friday afternoons, your victories and your questions.

So grab your coffee (or tea, if that's more your speed). Let's walk through this story together. Twenty-five days. Twenty-five glimpses of Jesus. And maybe along the way, we'll start seeing our own stories a little differently, too. Ready to begin?

Tracing Christ Throughout Scripture: The Scarlet Thread

Open your Bible anywhere. Genesis? There He is. Psalms? You'll find Him. The prophets? They couldn't stop talking about Him. God couldn't wait to tell us about His Son.

Consider Genesis 3. The world has barely begun, and everything has already gone sideways. Adam and Eve are hiding, sin has entered the picture, and right there—in humanity's darkest moment—God gives an incredible hint about what's coming: a promise about someone who will crush evil once and for all.

Fast forward through the centuries, each page adds another brushstroke to this portrait of Jesus. The prophets saw Him coming as a shepherd from tiny Bethlehem. They wrote about a servant who would carry our sin. They spoke of a king whose reign would never end. And then He arrived—not with fanfare or armies, but as a baby—the same one the prophets saw, both servant and king, humble and mighty.

When He died on that cross and stepped out of that tomb, He wasn't just making history; He was fulfilling it. Imagine what it must have been like for those first disciples—to suddenly see how every scroll they'd studied, every story they'd heard since childhood was all about Him.

The whole Bible tells one story. And Jesus? He's not just part of the story. He's the point of it.

Your Place in His Story: Discovering Your Worth in Christ

There's a line in *O Holy Night* that gets me every time: "Long lay the world in sin and error pining, 'til He appeared, and the soul felt its worth." Felt its worth. Not earned, not achieved—simply felt it, finally.

We live in a world of measures. Likes. Followers. Bank balances. Pixels and percentages. Numbers on screens that promise to tell us who we are. But Christmas tells a different story. The Creator of galaxies and garden flowers chose to enter His world as a newborn—for you.

Your worth isn't earned. Scripture speaks honestly about our condition—sinners by nature, hostile to God. And yet God's love reaches across the divide, not because we deserved it, but because love is who He is. Through Christ, we become new—not through our striving, but through His completed work: His life given. His death endured. His resurrection victorious.

When you look in the mirror, see what He sees. When you look at others, remember what He gave. Your value—their value—rests not in what we achieve but in who He is. This is the heart of Christmas: God making us His own.

The First Gospel

Genesis 3:15

“And I will make enemies of you and the woman, and of your offspring and her Descendant; He shall bruise you on the head, and you shall bruise Him on the heel.”

The Christmas story begins in an unexpected place: the Garden of Eden. Before stars guided wise men or angels sang to shepherds, God spoke. His words in the Garden of Eden held the first promise of Christmas. Here, in paradise lost, God planted the seed of paradise restored.

The Dawn of Creation

God spoke everything into existence. Each word shaped worlds. Light split darkness. Waters parted. Life burst forth in endless variety. Yet all this was a prelude to His masterpiece: humanity. Made in His image, we pleased God. He wanted us to enjoy close fellowship with Him.

On this unspoiled planet, Adam and Eve walked with God in the cool of the day. It was a bond between heaven and earth—a fearless, open, and natural friendship with God. They were free from the pain and brokenness we know all too well. This is the opening scene of redemption’s story. But as we know, the harmony of Eden did not last. Humanity’s greatest test was just ahead. It would change history and set the stage for God’s redemptive plan.

The First Choice: Trust Shattered

God gave us everything in that garden—everything except one tree. Not because He wanted to hold out on us. That tree stood there like a question: “Will you trust Me?” This close communion depended on trust in God’s Word. God tested this trust with a command: “but from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for on the day that you eat from it you will certainly die” (Genesis 2:17).

This wasn’t an arbitrary restriction. The tree stood for a choice. Satan didn’t kick down Eden’s gates or launch an all-out assault. He asked a question: “Did God really say...?” (Genesis 3:1). That’s all it took to plant the seed of doubt.

These words struck at the heart of trust. You know that feeling when someone suggests your best friend might be lying to you? How it makes you question everything? That’s what Satan did. He painted God not as the Father who walked with them in the cool of the evening, but as

someone with secrets to hide.

“You will not surely die” (Genesis 3:4). Satan painted God as a deceiver, not a loving Father. Eve listened. Adam joined. One choice—that’s what it took for everything to unravel. In one act of rebellion, paradise shattered.

Have you ever felt shame creep in? That sudden need to hide? Adam and Eve felt it first. Trust turned to terror. Those evening walks? Gone. They couldn’t look God in the face anymore. Shame entered the human experience. Fear replaced freedom. The close bond between Creator and creature broke. Humanity found themselves cut off from their source of life and love. We still feel those ripples today. Every broken relationship, every moment of fear, every instinct to hide—it all traces back to that garden, to that choice. But God didn’t leave the story there. No, this was just the beginning.

The First Gospel: The Protoevangelium

Even in Eden’s darkest hour, God was already thinking of Christmas. God turned to the serpent and spoke words that would shake history: “I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her Descendant; He shall bruise you on the head, and you shall bruise Him on the heel” (Genesis 3:15).

A child would come through a woman. And this child? He would crush the serpent’s head. In God’s words to the serpent was a message. Theologians call it the “protoevangelium”—the first gospel, the first good news, the first Christmas promise. Like a master storyteller, God dropped the first hint of hope in a hopeless tale.

Imagine Adam and Eve hearing these words. Standing there, hearts heavy with what they’d lost. And then hope breaks through—not a full explanation, not a detailed plan, enough light to see the next step.

The whole Christmas story—the star, the manger, the shepherds—it started here. In a garden. With a promise. And that promise? It would take centuries to unfold. Generations would watch and wait. But God had already set it in motion. The first notes of salvation’s song were already playing.

The End from the Beginning

But this wasn’t Plan B. Christmas wasn’t a backup plan or a divine emergency response when Eden fell apart. No, it was the plan. Always was. Revelation pulls back the curtain to reveal something stunning. God planned Christ’s coming “before the foundation of the world” (Revelation 13:8).

Think about that. Before the first ray of light split darkness. Before mountains pushed up through seas. Before Adam drew his first breath. God had already written the Christmas story in His heart.

When Mary laid her newborn in that rough-hewn manger, tiny hands reached up through the darkness. They were the same hands that had shaped the universe. Her midnight wonder was part of a dawn planned in eternity. Every star overhead knew its role in the story. Every prophecy had pointed here.

The cosmic scope of Christmas humbles us. Creation itself was the stage God built for this drama of redemption. Every galaxy, every heartbeat, every moment in history whispered of this. It foretold a coming. It was not a reaction from heaven to human failure; it was love's eternal plan.

And God didn't just plan to rescue us; He planned to adopt us. Christmas isn't just about fixing what broke in Eden. It's about fulfilling God's plan before Eden—to turn rebels into children and enemies into heirs.

There's comfort in this ancient plan. It reaches from eternity into our present trembling. Our salvation doesn't rest on human wisdom or strength. It flows from a Father's heart. He loved us before time began. God's love for us started well before there was a "when." He wrote the Christmas story into the very foundation of creation.

Hope for What's to Come: Final Victory Assured

The best stories come full circle. This one does. It starts in a garden and ends in... a garden. But not the one we lost—something far more spectacular. That promise spoken in Eden echoes through time until it thunders in Revelation. Satan, death, darkness—they don't get the final word. Not even close. Their judgment is swift and final as they are cast into the lake of fire.

This promise points toward creation's renewal. The manger leads to the cross, the cross to the empty tomb, the empty tomb to final victory. In Revelation's vision, Eden blooms again. It is now a glorious, eternal paradise. Death itself dies. The curse dissolves. God dwells with His people in unbroken fellowship.

Remember those evening walks Adam and Eve had with God? They're coming back, but better. No more broken fellowship. No more distance. No more goodbyes. And we get to be part of it.

The Christmas story is part of a larger arc, from Genesis to Revelation. Christ's birth initiates the final phase of God's war against evil. The baby in the manger grew up to be a warrior—not with sword and shield, but with nail-pierced hands and an empty tomb. He crushed the serpent's head by dying and rising again. Strange, isn't it? The whole story fits together perfectly. Almost like Someone planned it that way.

Your Response Today

The greatest gift ever offered had no shiny paper or silk ribbons. It came wrapped in simple cloth in a feeding trough. John, with his characteristic simplicity, puts it like this: "But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God" (John 1:12).

Stop here for a moment. Watch this exchange. In one instant, it's receiving; the next—complete transformation. No striving. No earning. No desperate trying to be good enough. Only... receiving. Like a child on Christmas morning.

Maybe you're thinking, "Is this really for me?" Yes. A million times yes. The same God who planned salvation before stars existed is reaching for you right now. And this gift comes with real power—the kind that changes things. Paul put it this way: "The God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet" (Romans 16:20). Notice he didn't say "under God's feet" or "under Christ's feet." He said "your" feet. You're living as children of the King. Every act of obedience pushes back the darkness and advances His Kingdom.

What a story God has been writing! It goes from a spoken promise in a broken garden to a baby's cry in the night. God crafted every word of it with such tender precision. Every moment is shaped by love we're still learning to comprehend. Sometimes we rush past the wonder of it all. We forget that God planned that first Christmas before He made the stars. How every prophecy, every longing, and every human hope found its answer in a manger.

A Prayer for the Day Ahead

Heavenly Father, we pause here in wonder. Open our eyes to see Your Christmas story as if for the first time—from that first promise in Eden when all seemed lost, to the moment Mary held heaven in her arms, from the shadow of the cross to the dawn of Your coming kingdom. Help us live as children of the King, carriers of Your light, bearers of Bethlehem's hope to a waiting world. For the wonder of Your plan, conceived in eternity; for the gift of Your Son, given in love; for the promise of Your kingdom, breaking into now—we thank You. In the name of Jesus, the promise fulfilled, Amen.

Reflection Questions for Believers

1. How does seeing Christmas as part of God's eternal plan change your view of the holiday and your own story?
2. Where do you see evidence of the ongoing conflict between the serpent and the Savior in today's world?
3. How can you participate more fully in God's redemptive work this Christmas season?

- "I've been reflecting on how God planned for Christ to come before He created the world. What are your thoughts on the idea that God has such a detailed plan for humanity?"
- "Where do you see the need for restoration in our world today?"
- "Christmas holds so much meaning as part of God's story of redemption. What do you think gives Christmas its meaning?"
